Remembering Edward Sharkey Canada 150 Exhibit in Tryon

As part of the Canada 150 celebrations in 2017, the Tryon & Area Historical Society, in cooperation with the Community Museums Association of PEI, featured the life and times of Edward Sharkey, 1867-1970, of North Tryon.

Edward Sharkey: Family Life

Edward John Sharkey was born August 17th, 1867 in King's County, PEI. He worked with Douglas Wright, in Bedeque, hauling milk to the Bedeque factory.

Around 1881, he moved to North Tryon to work with Edward Leard, a carpenter, building the Tryon Methodist Church, which is now the South Shore United Church, and a National Historic Site. He would have been 15 years old and probably started his career as a carpenter.

Edward's first wife was Victoria Alberta Thomas, born March 23rd, 1860. She was the daughter of William Thomas and Elizabeth Pooley.

Edward and Victoria had three children called Emily Sheridan, Charles Colson, and Laura Victoria.

Victoria Sharkey was known for her fine crafts and weaving skills, especially for the weaving of long panels of cloth for home spun blankets. She died on Feb. 6th, 1934 and is buried in the North Tryon Presbyterian Cemetery.

Edward Sharkey's second wife was Irene Josephine Blackmore Wood. She was born March 23rd, 1860, and was the daughter of Joseph Blackmore and Marjorie Clark of Searletown.

Irene had two children from her first marriage to Nathan Wood: Marjorie Eunice and Norman Foster. Irene died on July 26th, 1957, and is buried in the Tryon People's Cemetery, Tryon.

Ed Sharkey: Carpenter and Wheelwright

Edward Sharkey was a first class carpenter and wheelwright, and had worked at Ives' Mill and Chisholm's Furniture Factory in North Tryon.

The Chisholm Furniture Factory had its beginnings around 1863 when William Chisholm from Sunny Brae, NS, joined with Alexander Morrison of North Tryon in the furniture making business. The Morrison and Chisholm Factory continued until 1893 when Morrison and Chisholm dissolved partnership. William's son James joined with his father and from that date the business was known as Chisholm's Furniture Factory. They operated the factory

until William passed away in 1916. Jim operated the business in reduced fashion until 1942.



Mr. Sharkey's work record book shows him starting to work with James Chisholm on Saturday, November 15th, 1919, at \$2.00 per day, board not included.

Accounts are also entered during the period of 1923 to 1937 for work completed for various other people including G. Callbeck, R. Dixon, C. W. Ives, A. Kehoe, George Ives, John Howatt, and E. Inman.

Ed Sharkey: Fox Farming in the Maritimes

Mr. Sharkey installed electric burglar alarms on fox ranches all around the Maritimes. Some black fox breeding pairs sold up to \$30,000. After the alarms were installed, not a single fox was stolen. An ignition coil from a Ford Model A or T car is attributed to have been used in the electric alarm system.



This is a Maritime travel book which recounts the travels of the author, Will R. Bird, interviewing residents in various communities of the Maritimes. Around 1958 Mr. Bird stopped at Sheldon Dixon's store in North Tryon, and happened to meet up with Edward Sharkey. Edward was 91 at the time and the author remarked that he didn't look 80, and walked as easily as a young man. Here is the rest of the conversation with Mr. Sharkey. (p.211-213) **"Each time the alarms** worked perfectly and they nearly caught the fellows ... and if they had had cars instead of horses, the constables would have had their man," stated Mr. Sharkey. (Excerpt from Will R. Bird's book "These Are the Maritimes", Ryerson Press Publishers, Toronto, 1959)

Ed Sharkey: Retirement Years

In his retirement years Mr. Sharkey worked in his own shop building and repairing just about anything, windows,

doors, wheels, etc. He could be depended upon to set and sharpen a saw properly, or put a good cutting edge on a pair of lady's scissors.

He liked his early morning walks in the fresh air which probably had something to do with his longevity, living to be 103 years old!

Ed Sharkey and Premier Campbell Honored on 100th Birthday, 1967 (*Journal-Pioneer*)

Edward Sharkey died on November 13th, 1970 at the age of 103. He is buried in the North Tryon Presbyterian Church Cemetery.
